The Thousand Oaks Police Department continues to promote traffic safety within the community.

In an effort to recognize certain hazards while driving, the Traffic Bureau has started a monthly traffic awareness reminder program, addressing a traffic topic each month. While we focus on a specific topic each month, it's always imperative to understand and follow all rules of the road. The month of April is dedicated to 'Distracted Driving'.

Each year, hundreds of collisions occur in California and a majority of those collisions are caused by a distracted driver. Distracted driving is defined as anything that takes your eyes or mind off the road or your hands off the steering wheel, especially texting and cell phone use. These are the most dangerous things we do behind the wheel that many people do not think about because it is so common. Cell phone laws were enacted to help prevent distracted driving. In fact, any driver under the age of 18 cannot use a cell phone or any other electronic wireless device

means.

Here are some important facts you should know:

 California Vehicle Code section 23123(a) states: A person shall not drive a motor vehicle while using a wireless telephone unless that telephone is specifically designed and configured to allow hands free listening and talking and is used in that manner while driving. This section does not apply to a person using a wireless telephone for emergency purposes, including, but not limited to, an emergency call to a law enforcement agency, health care provider, fire department or other emergency services agency or entity.
 California Vehicle Code section 23123.5(a) states: A person shall not drive a motor vehicle while using an electronic wireless communications device to write, send, or read a text-based communication, unless the electronic wireless communications device is specifically designed and configured to allow voice operated and hands free operation to

dictate, send or listen to a text based communication, and it is used in that manner while driving. 3. California Vehicle Code section 23124(b) states: A person under the age of 18 shall not drive a motor vehicle while using a wireless telephone, or an electronic wireless communications device, even if equipped with a hands-free device. Research indicates 5 seconds is the average time your eyes are off the road while texting. When traveling at a speed of 55 mph, that's enough time to cover the length of a football field blindfolded. The Thousand Oaks Traffic Bureau urges citizens to drive safely at all times and without any distractions. Some recommendations from the Thousand Oaks Traffic Bureau include: Never text and drive a. Since 2011, OTS has conducted an observational study of handheld cell phone use every year. "This year's study on the use of handheld cell phones and texting shows a decrease over past years; however, more work needs to be done to target those who were observed to still be breaking the law," said OTS Director Rhonda Craft. "The best way to put an end to distracted driving is to educate all Californians about the danger it poses. We will do this through enforcement and education efforts like our new advertising campaign "Just Drive", reminding drivers to put down their phones and focus on the road."

"California's distracted driving laws have been saving lives for a decade now," said former State Senator Joe Simitian, who authored the state's hands-free and no-texting laws. "Every day, somewhere in California, someone is sitting down to dinner with their family who wouldn't have made it through the day without these laws on the books. That's tremendously gratifying."

Preliminary 2017 data also shows nearly 22,000 drivers were involved in distracted driving collisions in California, a decline from the more than 33,000 drivers involved in distracted driving collisions in 2007, the last full year before the hands-free law went into effect.

"Smart phones are part of everyone's lives now. Texting, phone calls and posting on social media are nearly addicting," said Commander Murray, Camarillo PD. "But doing these things can have deadly consequences while driving on our city's streets. Changing these dangerous habits will help make our roadways safer for everyone."

The Ventura County Sheriff's Office has the following Safety Tips:

- If you receive a text message or need to send one, pull over and park your car in a safe location, but '

- Designate your passenger as your "designated texter." Allow them access to your phone to respond to calls or messages.

- Do not engage in social media scrolling or messaging while driving.

- Cell phone use can be habit-forming. Struggling to

Investigators from the Camarillo Police Department's Special Enforcement Detail and the Ventura County Sheriff's Special Crimes Unit responded and began an investigation. After getting additional information and conducting interviews, they confirmed illegal prostitution activities were occurring at the motel. A 51 year-old female was found in one of the motel rooms. Based on all of the evidence and information obtained during the investigation, detectives determined the female was being sexually exploited and she was a victim of human trafficking. This female victim was immediately provided with several county resources. These county services inform victims of their rights and options for safely leaving their trafficking situation. Investigators also determined one of the hotel clerks, identified as Ratan Raj Anandeshi, was aware of, and aided in, the				
illegal prostitution activities occurring at the motel. Based upon the				
th 2018, Camarillo's Special Enforcement Unit and Ventura County Sheriff's Office Special Crimes Unit followed up on a routine patrol call and discovered a female victim of human trafficking. A man was arrested for aiding in prostitution. th 2018, patrol units responded to a call for possible prostitution at a local Camarillo motel. Through extensive training in identifying human trafficking incidents, patrol deputies quickly realized this as a possible incident and requested the assistance of specialized units.				

results of this investigation, Ratan was arrested for Penal Code 653.23(a) (1), which includes activities that aid prostitution. Anandeshi was booked into the Ventura County Jail with a pending court date. VCSO Special Crimes Unit will continue to investigate this case.

The Ventura County Sheriff's Office has a dedicated human trafficking investigator assigned to the Special Crimes Unit. The Sheriff's Office investigates human trafficking cases with a victim centered approach. The Sheriff's Office teams up with public and private organizations to bridge the gap in resources for these victims. In this particular case, Interface and the Federal Bureau of Investigations victim services unit provided assistance to the victim in this case.

The Camarillo Special Enforcement Detail will aggressively investigate any reports of suspected prostitution or human trafficking occurring within the city. The Camarillo Police Department would also like to remind local business establishments that employees who are aware of any prostitution activities and aid those illegal activities may be subject to arrest. This investigation would not have been possible without the assistance of members of our community. Anyone with information regarding possible human trafficking is encouraged to contact the Camarillo Police Department.

National Public Safety Telecommunications Week is April 8 ' 14, 2018, and the Ventura County Sheriff's Office is honoring the public safety dispatchers who serve as the lifeline between people

in need and vital law enforcement services. These public safety dispatchers have dedicated their careers to providing superior service to people who have a need for law enforcement assistance. In many cases, the dispatcher can make the difference between life and death.

In 2017, the public safety dispatchers and supervisors at the Ventura County Sheriff's Office answered more than 363,000 telephone calls, including over 103,000 9-1-1 calls and every year, that number grows. Day in, and day out, hundreds of people depend on the skill, expertise and commitment of the dispatchers who work in public safety communications. These team members

help save countless lives by handling emergency telephone calls, dispatching law enforcement resources, and providing moral support to people in distress. Their normal workday is nothing but

abnormal in so many ways.

Public safety dispatchers must undergo a rigorous testing and background process before being

hired. After they have been hired, new dispatchers must attend a three-week Basic Dispatcher Course that is certified by the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST). Typically, their training also includes 2 additional weeks of classroom training and between 6 ' 12

months of on-the-job training before the new dispatcher is allowed to work independently. Even then, approximately 50% of the dispatchers hired are not able to successfully complete the training program due to the unique demands and stress of the job.

Within the Ventura County Sheriff's Office, we are celebrating the valuable contributions that our public safety dispatchers make on a daily basis. We are incredibly fortunate to have such

talented and dedicated professionals who work so hard to serve the public and our deputies.

Please join us in thanking them for doing such an excellent job at fulfilling a critical role in public safety.

On 04/05/2018, Detectives from the Ventura County Sheriff's West County Narcotic's Street Team concluded a three month long narcotic investigation into Oxnard resident, Ernesto Reynoso, who was involved in the sales of methamphetamine to residents of Ventura County. The West County Street Team was assisted by the Oxnard Police Department's Neighborhood Policing Team.

Detectives detained Reynoso and Selina Orta during a traffic stop in the city of Oxnard, where Orta was found to be in possession of methamphetamine. A signed search warrant was then executed at Reynoso's residence and storage locker which were also located in the city of Oxnard.

During the search of Reynoso's residence and storage locker, Detectives located approximately 12 ounces of methamphetamine, narcotics paraphernalia indicative of methamphetamine sales and a sum of currency deemed to be proceeds of illegal narcotic sales.

Narrative:

Camarillo Police detectives arrested seven people for illegal firearm possession and seized 15 firearms during a four month long investigation targeting illegal weapon violations within the City of Camarillo.

In December of 2017, the Camarillo Police Department Special Enforcement Detail (SED) began an investigation into illegal firearm possession. SED detectives worked closely with the Ventura County Sheriff's Office Crime Analysis Unit and several other Sheriff investigative units to target criminal activity involving the illegal possession of firearms and ammunition. One of the main focuses of this investigation was to identify and remove firearms and ammunition from criminals and people prohibited from possessing firearms and ammunition due to previous criminal

During this four month operation, SED detectives conducted several investigations that resulted in the seizure of eight rifles, including one AK-47 assault rifle, seven handguns, and over four hundred rounds of ammunition. In addition to the illegally possessed firearms, SED detectives seized four ounces of methamphetamine, varying amounts of heroin, cocaine and prescription medication possessed for the purpose of sales, stolen property, and recovered one stolen vehicle. Investigators also seized about \$2500 in U.S. currency that is believed to be the result of illegal activities. Seven people were arrested for various weapons related charges at locations throughout the city. These arrests included illegal possession of a firearm and ammunition by a prohibited person, convicted felon in possession of a firearm, assault on a peace officer, and possession of illegal drugs for the purpose of sales. Five of the individuals arrested have pending court dates and are facing varying sentences. Two of those arrested have already pled guilty to weapons violations in Ventura County Superior Court and have either been sentenced or are awaiting sentencing.

The Camarillo Police Department's Special Enforcement Detail is a five person plain clothes detail that conducts a variety of investigations of crimes occurring within the City of Camarillo. The goal of SED is to reduce property crime and violent crime through investigations and directed enforcement. SED is responsible for conducting gang-related investigations, probation / parole searches, and they often work closely with Camarillo Police Department's detective bureau. SED also often works in conjunction with other Sheriff's units and outside agencies in a cooperative effort to reduce crime within our city. This recent investigation would not have been possible without the coordinated effort of all the involved Sheriff bureaus. Detectives from the Camarillo Police Department Special Enforcement Detail will continue to aggressively investigate any reports of suspected illegal weapons / firearms possession. Narrative:

Two suspects were identified and arrested for operating a motorcycle chop shop operation in Thousand Oaks and Simi Valley. During the investigation, deputies recovered three stolen motorcycles and multiple motorcycle parts from two storage units. The parts are believed to be from at least four other stolen motorcycles.

Since January 1, 2018, the city of Thousand Oaks has had a dramatic increase in reported motorcycle thefts. A total of 11 motorcycles have been reported stolen and all were taken during late night or early morning hours.

On the morning of April 10, 2018, Thousand Oaks patrol deputies recovered three stolen motorcycles, from three separate locations, all within a quarter mile of 3000 Grande Vista. At each of the recovery locations, deputies located neighboring businesses that had exterior surveillance cameras. By viewing the surveillance footage, deputies determined each of the stolen motorcycles was dropped off by the same two suspects.

Detectives canvased the area and identified a storage unit in the 3000 Block of Grande Vista that may be related to the thefts. During the investigation, detectives determined the storage unit belonged to Joanna Shoop. Shoop was positively identified as one of the suspects depicted in the surveillance footage.

On April 12, 2018, Investigators located Shoop in the Simi Valley area and identified Brian Wendorf as the second suspect. Wendorf is currently on Ventura County probation for previous narcotics related offences and was also out on \$30,000 bail for a prior vehicle theft arrest. Investigators arrested Shoop and Wendorf and identified a second storage unit in the 4400 block of Industrial Street in Simi Valley. Shoop was transported and booked into the Pre-Trial Detention Facility in Ventra. Wendorf was transported and booked into the East Valley Jail. On April 13, 2018, Investigators served search warrants at both storage unit locations and located multiple disassembled motorcycles. Investigators believe the motorcycle parts are from at least 4 additional stolen motorcycles.

On April 16, 2018, The Ventura County District Attorney's Office filed three counts of vehicle theft and one count of operating a 'Chop Shop' on Shoop and Wendorf. Both are currently in custody on \$100,000 bail.

Narrative:

On April 18, 2018, at approximately 2:26 a.m., a robbery occurred in the 3300 block of East Faria Street in the City of Camarillo.

Upon arrival, deputies discovered a male victim had been attending a party in the area when he was pinned against the wall inside the home and physically assaulted by five males. During the assault, the suspects took numerous pieces of expensive jewelry from the victim's person. One of the suspects threatened to kill the victim. Fearing for his life, the victim got away from the suspects by jumping through a closed living room glass window. On 04/20/18, Ojai Police Department deputies took a report of a voluntary missing adult, Katherine Kampf-Thibodeau.

On 04/24/2018, four days after the initial report, Ojai Police detectives, in conjunction with the San Joaquin County Sheriff's Office, Lodi Police Department, Grass Valley Police Department, and the Nevada City Police Department continued to work on the case and gathered new intelligence that escalated the voluntary missing adult to an "At Risk" missing adult. Once the missing adult became an "At Risk" missing adult, Ojai Station Detectives reached out to the Ventura County Sheriff's Special Services Major Crimes Unit to assist. The Special Services detectives joined efforts with the above listed agencies as well as our Ventura County Upper Ojai Search and Rescue Unit, Ventura Sheriff's Aviation Unit and other Ventura County contract cities to help locate Kampf-Thibodeau.

As new information continued to surface, multiple leads were followed and Ventura County Sheriff's detectives coordinated systematic searches throughout the state. As the City of Ojai was actively being searched, Sheriff's detectives staged the Ventura County Sheriff's Aviation Unit, search dogs and multiple Search and Rescue Units for a follow-up search the next day (04-25-2018).

In the midst of searching for Katherine, the Nevada City Police Department informed detectives that Katherine Kampf-Thibodeau had been arrested by their agency for being under the influence of drugs. According to their agency's records, Kampf-Thibodeau had been contacted on a couple occasions (over the last four days) but gave a false name each time she was contacted.

When Kampf-Thibodeau was booked she provided the fictitious name she had used during the previous contacts. While in their custody, Kampf-Thibodeau's fingerprints were entered into the system which revealed her true identity. The Nevada City Police Department then immediately contacted Ventura County Sheriff's detectives as they learned she had been reported missing.

As a public service announcement, the Ventura County Sheriff's Office would like to thank the community and all the law enforcement entities that helped resolve this case in a timely manner. As an agency we were relieved Katherine Kampf-Thibodeau was located, even though the presence of narcotics played a troubling role in this incident. We would like to remind community to just say, "No" to drugs and search for any resources near you if you feel you, or a loved one, may have a problem with drugs.

Thousand Oaks, CA ' The Thousand Oaks Police Department Traffic Unit will be conducting a Driver's License/DUI Checkpoint on April 28, 2018 at an undisclosed location(s) within the city limits.

The deterrent effect of High Visibility Enforcement using both DUI checkpoints and DUI Saturation Patrols has proven to lower the number of persons killed and injured in alcohol or drug impaired crashes. Research shows that crashes involving an impaired driver can be reduced by up to 20 percent when well-publicized proactive DUI operations are conducted routinely.

DUI Checkpoints like this one are placed in locations based on collision statistics and frequency of DUI arrests, affording the greatest opportunity for achieving drunk and drugged driving deterrence. Locations are chosen with safety considerations for the officers and the public.

In California, alcohol involved collisions led to 1,155 deaths and nearly 24,000 serious injuries in 2014 because someone failed to designate a sober driver. Locally, over the course of the past three years, DUI collisions have claimed 6 lives and resulted in 85 injury crashes harming 112 of our friends and neighbors.

Officers will be looking for signs of alcohol and/or drug impairment, with officers checking drivers for proper licensing, delaying motorists only momentarily. When possible, specially trained officers will be available to evaluate those suspected of drug-impaired driving, which now accounts for a growing number of impaired driving crashes.

Studies of California drivers have shown that 30 percent of drivers in fatal crashes had one or more drugs in their systems. A study of active drivers showed more tested positive for drugs that may impair driving (14 percent) than did for alcohol (7.3 percent). Of the drugs, marijuana was most prevalent, at 7.4 percent, slightly more than alcohol. Everyone should be mindful that if you're taking medication ' whether prescription or over-the-counter ' drinking even small

amounts of alcohol can greatly intensify the impairment affects.

The California Office of Traffic Safety DDVIP (Designated Driver VIP) mobile app is now available for free to download on iOS and Android devices. Launched last year, the new DDVIP app offers enhanced features, allowing users to "Map a Spot" with their current location to find DDVIP partnering establishments in their area or a "List of Spots" to search all participating bars and restaurants throughout California.
